- Has a population of approximately 750,000
- Is the largest island off the North American west coast at over 32,000 square km. with 3.440 km of coastline
- Is home to 2.855 farms, including 991 in Greater Victoria and 700 in the Cowichan Valley
- Is home to some of the world's largest spruce trees, some reaching heights over 95 metres and living for 800 vears and more
- Is home to 7,000 known species inhabiting the coastal waters, over 200 species of migratory birds and 33 species of land mammals
- Is known as one of the best caving areas in the world, with over 1.050 known caves
- Is home to Nitinat Lake, the top windsurfing destination in North America

Victoria:

- Is on the southern tip of Vancouver Island, and is the capital of British Columbia, with a population of approximately 344,615
- Is named after Queen Victoria, and has been called the city of the newly wed and nearly dead. Almost 18% of the population is over 65 years of age. The median age in Victoria is 43.1 years, four years older than in metro Vancouver.
- Gets 2,183 hours of sunshine per year and 8 months that are frost free
- Is internationally renowned as the "City of Gardens," and has 950 hanging baskets adorning lampposts throughout the city each summer
- Serves 750,000 cups of tea annually at the Fairmont Empress Hotel
- The surrounding waters are home to 3 resident pods of orca whales, totaling over 80 mammals
- Is home to 13% of the Canadian Olympic team that participated in the 2008 Olympic Summer Games in Beijing
- Has 3,333 lights illuminating the Parliament Buildings every night
- Has the second highest number of restaurants per capital in North America, second only to San Francisco
- Has the second oldest China town in North America, second only to San Francisco. You will find the narrowest alley in all of Canada here (Fan Tan Alley)
- Has over 70 city parks, including Beacon Hill Park which is home to the Mile "O" marker for the 8,000 km Trans Canada Trail.

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
